Whereas, the City of Pinellas Park is to receive a supplemental allocation totaling \$235,484 of CDBG funds as authorized by the Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security Act (CARES), Public Law 116-136, known as CDBG-CV; and

Whereas, these special CDBG-CV funds are to be used to prevent, prepare for, and respond to the coronavirus pandemic (COVID-19); and

Whereas, HUD authorized a waiver to amend the Public Comment Period to no less than five (5) calendar days in order to establish expedited procedures to draft, propose, or amend consolidated plans and annual action plans to respond quickly to the growing spread and effects of COVID-19;

WHEREAS, the Mayor and City Council find that it is in the best interest of the residents of the City of Pinellas Park to amend the Plans, thereby serving a valid public purpose; and

WHEREAS, the public notices, hearings, and other presubmission requirements as set forth in 24 CFR Part 91 and in accordance with the City's amended Citizen Participant Plan, have been accomplished by including, but not limited to, the following: a public notice was posted on May 20, 2020 making the

Substantial Amendment available for five (5) calendar days allowing the public viewing and comment opportunities, and a public hearing held on Thursday, June 11, 2020 to consider and to obtain views of citizens regarding the Substantial Amendments to the approved 2018-2022 Consolidated Plan and 2019 Action Plan; and

WHEREAS, the Mayor and City Council desire to approve the amendments and authorize submission of the Substantial Amendments to HUD for review and acceptance; and

WHEREAS, the Mayor and City Council of Pinellas Park, Pinellas County, Florida does meet now this June 11, 2020 to authorize the submission of the Substantial Amendments to HUD.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE MAYOR AND CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF PINELLAS PARK, PINELLAS COUNTY, FLORIDA, AS FOLLOWS:

#### II. BACKGROUND INFORMATION

In response to the Coronavirus Pandemic (COVID-19) the United States Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) has notified the City of Pinellas Park that it will receive an allocation of \$235,484 of Community Development Block Grant Program — Coronavirus Response funds (CDBG-CV) to be used to prevent, prepare for, and respond to COVID-19. This allocation was authorized by the Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security Act (CARES Act), Public Law 116-136 on March 27, 2020, to respond to the growing effects of this historic public health crisis.

The City of Pinellas Park's federal Annual Action Plan details the funding strategy for the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) each year. The Annual Action Plan implements a jurisdiction's multi-year Consolidated Plan and is developed through significant citizen participation, analysis, and planning. The process for amending the Consolidated Plan and/or Annual Action Plan is described in the City's Citizen Participation Plan, which details the efforts Pinellas Park will take to encourage the community to participate in plan development. It also describes the process for amending the Consolidated Plan and/or Annual Action Plan when necessary.

Allocating the CDBG-CV funds for activities that address the impacts of COVID-19 requires Pinellas Park to conduct the Substantial Amendment process for both the Consolidated and Annual Action Plans. While the extent of needed relief and assistance related to COVID-19 has not yet been determined in Pinellas Park as the crisis continues, the City is proposing the following amendments:

Consolidated Plan: Public Services will be added as a priority goal.

#### Annual Action Plan:

- CDBG-CV funds (\$188,389) will be utilized for activities necessary in the preparation for, the prevention
  of and in response to the COVID-19 crisis throughout Pinellas Park. Planned activities will benefit eligible
  families with housing needs, agencies providing public services, and agencies providing homeless and
  homeless prevention services, recovery and local planning needs.
- CDBG-CV funds (\$47,095) twenty (20) percent will be allocated for planning and administration activities related to implementing COVID-19 programs.

#### SUMMARY

- A. <u>Findings</u>: Per HUD guidelines, a 5-day public comment period, for review of the proposed Substantial Amendments to the Consolidated and Annual Action Plans was published in the Tampa Bay Times on May 20, 2020. The 5-day public comment period was in effect from May 20 May 25, 2020. All comments, if any, will be included as an appendix to the submitted Consolidated and Annual Action Plans.
- **B.** <u>Staff Recommendation</u>: Staff recommends City Council approve the Substantial Amendments to the 2018-2022 Consolidated Plan and Program Year 2019 Annual Action Plan.

# **Background**

<u>Background:</u> The City of Pinellas Park's (City) 2018 – 2022 Consolidated Plan details the City's overall strategy for addressing housing, community, and economic development needs and defines how the City will distribute grant funds. The City's Consolidated Plan covers the goals and objectives of the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) Program which is funded through HUD. The City recently performed a review of all facets of the CDBG program in order to maximize available federal funds and better implement projects and programs serving low to moderate income residents of Pinellas Park.

On June 27, 2020, The City Council approved a substantial amendment to the originally approved 2018-2022 Consolidated Plan. That amendment included removing two priority goals: 1) Public Services and, 2) Owner-occupied Housing Rehabilitation. Funds planned for these priority areas were earmarked toward Public Facilities and Infrastructure Improvements. The Priority goal of Planning & Administration was increased from 10% to 15% of the City's annual CDBG allocation.

The March 27, 2020 passage of the Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security Act (CARES Act), Public Law 116-136, provides \$5 billion in Community Development Block Grant funds to be used to prevent, prepare for, and respond to the Coronavirus (COVID-19). As an entitlement community, Pinellas Park received \$235,484 in Community Development Block Grant-Coronavirus (CDBG-CV) funds from the Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD). To expedite the disbursement of the City's new CDBG-CV funds, via 24 CFR 5.110, the CARES Act authorized HUD to grant waivers to the public notice, public comment, and citizen participation plan requirements found in 24 CFR 91.105(2) and (k) and 24 CFR 91.40.

In addition to the public notice/comment waivers, the CARES Act also established the following regulatory waivers, which Pinellas Park will utilize under this proposed Substantial Amendment to the 2018-2022 Consolidated Plan.

- 1. The public services cap of 15% is suspended for the City's 2019, 2020, and new CDBG-CV funds.
- 2. The CARES Act allows for COVID-19 related pre-award costs for eligible reimbursable costs funded through CDBG-CV only. This does not apply to the City's 2019 and 2020 CDBG funds; pre-award costs are limited to no more than 25% or \$58,871 of the City's CDBG-CV grant amount.
- 3. The CARES Act permits the use of virtual public hearings when necessary for public health reasons.
- 4. The CARES Act permits Citizen Participation Plan Amendments and other Plan publications to occur concurrently.

#### **Substantial Amendments**

<u>Proposal:</u> The Substantial Amendments to the City's 2018-2022 Consolidated Plan and 2019 Action Plan will result in the allocation of \$235,484 of CDBG-CV funds and further address the City's effort to comply with HUD's regulatory requirements in administering the City's CDBG Program, including CDBG-CV funds. The Amendment to the City's Citizen Participation Plan will expedite the City's disbursement of funds and accelerate the City's COVID-19 recovery efforts for its residents, businesses, and non-profit organizations. The proposed changes to the 2018-2022 Consolidated Plan follow on the next page. (CDBG-CV funding depicted in pink.)

# **Citizen Participation**

As it relates to the recent HUD memo of Aril 9, 2020 titled the "CARES Act Flexibilities for CDBG Funds Used to Support Coronavirus Response and Plan Amendment Waiver", these substantial amendments meet criteria within the Citizen Participation Plan. The City of Pinellas Park intends to exercise the following waivers:

- 1) Exceed the 15% Public Service Cap for COVID-19 related activities for the CDBG-CV, Program Year 2019, and PY 2020 CDBG Programs.
- 2) Reimburse costs incurred for response to COVID-19 with the CDBG-CV, provided that they are in compliance with CDBG requirements.

The City of Pinellas Park's Community Development Department has provided a public notice in the Tampa Bay Times advertising a 5-day public comment period regarding the amendments here within as part of the citizen participation requirements. The 5-day public comment period began on June 3, 2020 and closed on June 8<sup>th</sup>, 2020. An advertised public hearing allowing for citizen input will be held at 6:00 p.m. on June 25<sup>th</sup>, 2020, scheduled to be held in Council Chambers, located at Pinellas Park City Hall 5141 78<sup>th</sup> Avenue N., Pinellas Park, FL 33781; however, due to health precautions related to COVID-19, the public hearing will take place at the Pinellas Park Performing Arts Center located at 4951 78<sup>th</sup> Avenue N., Pinellas Park, FL 33781.

The City of Pinellas Park will consider any comments or views of residents, agencies, or other interested parties received in writing or orally prior to submitting this substantial amendment to HUD. A summary of comments will be labeled Exhibit B and included with the substantial amendment.
